Public Policy Priorities

2017 Legislative Agenda

- Maintain autonomous structures for regulatory boards and agencies
- Protect the rights of individuals to access education, career opportunities and professional counseling services regardless of ethnic origin, gender identity, sexual orientation or socio-economic status
- Increase Medicaid and third party payor reimbursement rates to 100 percent for all providers
- Amend the Texas Occupation Code to authorize Licensed Marriage and Family Therapists to diagnose
- Require school districts to report in Public Education Information Management Systems (PEIMS) the number of Certified School Counselors on each campus
- Establish standards to ensure that counseling services in academic and clinical settings are provided by Licensed and/or Certified Professional Counselors
- Allow LPC-Interns to be reimbursed for services provided under supervision to Medicaid clients
- Establish strong and consistent certification standards for Professional School Counselors

Professional Counselors are required by Texas statutes to hold master's or doctoral degrees, complete extensive hours of post-graduate supervision, pass rigorous licensing exams and pursue continuing education. Certified School Counselors must also have two years of classroom teaching experience.

Professional Counselors work in private practice; at elementary and secondary schools; on college campuses; in criminal justice facilities; at community mental health centers, hospitals, nursing homes, managed care and non-profit agencies; and other settings across Texas.
